Fellow Chamber Music Lovers,

Chamber Music is a coming together of individual voices to create something greater. By playing together chamber musicians create a more complete



performance, with fuller harmonies, richer counterpoint and greater power. By listening to each other and responding in the moment, they create performances that are greater than their individual contributions and that are fueled by the magic of the unexpected.

It has been four years since we held the last Plowman Chamber Music Competition, during which time our society experienced isolation of unprecedented proportions due to a pandemic. The fifteen ensembles that take the Plowman stage are a testament to the resilience of musicians in these trying times. Through the pandemic, they kept their individual musical voices alive, and now come together to present performances not in isolation, but in musical conversations with each other, witnessed and shared by the public. More than ever, chamber music is a powerful symbol of the universal need we have for communication and community.

Chamber music celebrates collaboration as does the 10th Plowman Chamber Music Competition and Festival. It is a co-presentation of the Odyssey Chamber Music Series, the First Baptist Church, the University of Missouri System, the MU School of Music, the University Concert Series, MOSY, and is made possible through the generous contributions of private donors, the energy of countless volunteers, and the additional support of numerous other organizations such as the Missouri Arts Council (MAC), the City of Columbia Office of Cultural Affairs (OCA), MU's Organized Resource Group (ORG), the Mid-Missouri Area Music Teachers Association (MMAMTA) of Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) and the Mid-Missouri Collegiate Chapter (MMCC) of MTNA. Its events take place in the First Baptist Church, Whitmore Hall of the MU Fine Arts Building, Sheryl Crow Hall of the Singuefield Music Center and the Missouri Theatre.

The competition features top chamber ensembles from across the country that have passed a rigorous video tape round. As always, the chosen semi-finalists

represent a diverse collection of ensemble configurations, including saxophone quartets, string quartets, piano trios and woodwind quintets, among others. All represent the highest artistic and technical achievement, a level that continues to rise with each edition of the competition. Audiences are sure to be thrilled as these incredible groups vie for the Plowman Grand Prize.

This year's Plowman judges have stellar careers of their own performing throughout the world, joining our illustrious list from previous years. Pianist Lucille Chung made her debut with the Montreal Symphony at age 10, and had graduated from both the Curtis Institute of Music and the Juilliard School by the time she was 20. She has soloed with over 70 orchestras, performed recitals in over 35 countries, and is the wife of our 2017 piano judge, Alessio Bax. String judge Amit Peled has performed all over the world on the Goffriller cello, the instrument once owned by Pablo Casals. A sought-after teacher at the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore, Peled is a member of the Tempest Trio, and artistic director of the Mount Vernon Virtuosi. And finally, hornist Jeff Scott performed for 20 years in the Imani Winds, a group who in 2017 was honored with a permanent installation at the Smithsonian Museum of African American History. He has a diverse career, having performed as a studio, chamber and orchestral musician, performing in Broadway shows, Ballet companies, touring with various commercial artists as well as recording for film, classical music, pop and jazz music, and now serves on the faculty of the Oberlin Conservatory.

Thank you for joining us as we welcome the competing ensembles of the 2023 Plowman Chamber Music Competition to Columbia. As always, we look forward to hearing their music on our Plowman stage, but even more to watching their journeys as they move forward into their future musical careers,

Her journey in learning and musical artistry includes study with David McKamie, Janice Wenger, Natalia Bolshakova, Paul Crabb, James Douglass, and countless

talented musicians with whom she has had the privilege to collaborate.



Carol Elliott is the principal cellist of the Columbia Civic Orchestra. As a freelance musician, she has performed in numerous ensembles in Missouri and other states where she has lived. Carol has a B.M. degree from Oberlin College Conservatory of Music and a M.M. from Northern Illinois University, both in cello performance. Besides being a musician, Carol is an information technology architect.



Peter Lea is an Associate Teaching Professor of Music Theory and Director of Undergraduate Studies in the School of Music at the University of Missouri. He holds a PhD in Music Theory from the University of Western Ontario and a MM and BM in Piano Performance from Brandon University. Lea's research interests include music theory pedagogy, performance and analysis, and the music of George Crumb. Before pursuing a music theory degree, he taught piano in the Eckhardt-Gramatté Conservatory of Music

and, as a pianist, collaborated with artists from across Canada.

About the MMAMTA Pre-Collegiate Master Class Audition:

At the beginning of the month of Plowman Competition & Festival, interested precollegiate instrumentalists are encouraged to audition for the respective instrumental guest artists who are in residence for the Plowman Chamber Music Competition. The MMAMTA teachers understand the need for their advanced pre-collegiate students to have a goal for rare opportunities, to encourage them for inspired, quality instructions. Pianists must perform a work by memory, and while memorization is optional for other instrumentalists, they must perform with an accompanist unless it is a solo work.

Ema Iwasaki began playing the piano in Japan under Hiroko Shimizu from 2009-2013, and later with Judith Shaw from 2013-2020. She currently studies with Ayako Tsuruta. Since 2014, Ema has participated in the National Federated Music Clubs Junior Festival, receiving superior ratings and has twice won the Missouri Music Teachers Association's State Competition. In 2023 she won the MMAMTA/Odyssey Pre-collegiate Aria Concerto Competition, performing the first movement of the Saint-Saens Piano Concerto No. 2 with orchestra. As pianist, she has also performed movements of Saint-Saens' Carnival of the Animals on the Odyssey "Kids@Heart" concerts, solo performances on the Blind Boone Concert Series and in the Missouri Theatre on the Missouri Symphony League's Piano Showcase, and on a master class with Mia Kim and Albert Kim. Ema also serves as pianist for Bethel Church, and plays violin in her school orchestra and through the Missouri Academy of Music and through the Young Hearts Music Program.

Graham Bond is a junior studying mechanical engineering with minors in music, mathematics, and aerospace engineering. He performs research on 4D printing in Dr. Jian Lin's Advanced Manufacturing Laboratory, and was recently recognized as a Department of Defense SMART Scholar, Mizzou's first in over a decade. Graham is also the co-founder and treasurer of Mizzou's new aeronautical engineering team, the AeroTigers, and the vice president of the Pi Tau Sigma Honors Society. As a music minor, he has performed as an oboist in the University's Wind Ensemble, piano on the Odyssey Chamber Music Series, and has been able to cultivate his love for piano under Dr. Miyamoto, earning two honorable mentions at MMTA Collegiate Honors Competitions.

Tenson Liang was born in Taipei, Taiwan, where he began piano studies at the age of five. After earning a bachelor's degree in civil engineering in Taiwan, his passion for piano led him performance studies at the Peabody Conservatory and UMKC. Currently studying at the University of Missouri with Dr. Peter Miyamoto, his previous teachers have included Gwyneth Chen, Brian Ganz and Alon Goldstein. He won several awards including First Prize in the National Taiwan Mandarin Daily News Piano Competition and a Gold Medal at the Taiwan National Young-Artist Piano Competition, and was a Finalist at both the Wideman International Piano Competition and the West Virginia International Piano Competition. He recently won the graduate division of the MMTA Collegiate Honors Auditions, and received honorable mention in the 2023 Jefferson City Symphony Orchestra Piano Concerto Competition. Tenson has been a guest musician in the Emerald Coast Music Alliance and has served as a jury member in the Musica Piano Competition. In 2020, Tenson founded Classical Music Express, a concert association that has brought more than 50 concerts to different neighborhoods in Kansas City.

Ryan Kee is a junior piano major at the University of Missouri, studying with Dr. Peter Miyamoto. He was previously a student of Eunsil Stevenson in St. Louis. He is winner of the 2022 of the McClure Piano Award and the 2021 Nelson Piano Scholarship, both sponsored by the Missouri Federation of Music Clubs (MFMC), and winner of the 2020 Missouri Music Teachers Associations (MMTA) Collegiate Honors Auditions. He also received Honorable Mention in the 2021 Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) Young Artist Competition and won third prize and was a two-time finalist in the Steinway Competition. In 2021 Ryan was chosen by the World Piano Teachers Association (WPTA) to present a full-length recital, and has performed multiple times on the Odyssey Chamber Music Series.

BIOGRAPHIES

Jennifer Lochhead of St. Joseph, Missouri is pursuing a bachelor of music in cello performance at Mizzou in the studio of Dr. Eli Lara. She previously studied with Sascha Groschange prior to college and with Ezgi Karakus at Missouri Western State University. She has performed as a member of the University Philharmonic at the University of Missouri, the Columbia Civic Orchestra, and the Missouri Symphony. A passionate music educator, Jennifer has taught for the Missouri Symphony Conservatory, Missouri Academy of Music, the MU Community Music Program, the Missouri String Project, and in her growing private studio. She plans to graduate in May 2024 and hopes to continue studying in a master of music program in cello performance.

Sam Whitty (b. 2001) is a cellist and composer from Kansas City, Missouri. He is a Sinquefield Scholar at the University of Missouri studying music composition and will graduate in May 2023. A number of groups have premiered his compositions including the Mizzou New Music Ensemble, Khemia Ensemble, Duo Cortona, and the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra. He has also received commissions from the Sheldon Foundation and the Northland Symphony Youth Orchestra in 2022. Next year, the Staley Falcon Philharmonia will premiere a new work composed by Sam for the school's 15-year anniversary.

A recipient of the 2022 Rogers Whitmore String Award, cellist Nate Roberts is in his final semester of study in the Bachelor of Arts in Music program at Mizzou. While at MU, he has performed as a member of several string quartets, the Kaizen Piano Trio, MU Camerata, University Chamber Soloists, and as co-principal of the University Philharmonic. During Summer 2022, Nate was a core member of the Missouri Symphony during its summer music festival. He has recorded various albums and singles with Samuel William- "Middlebush" and Joel Rodriguez, and he is a regular performer with award-winning Leme Ensemble at special events, weddings, and church services. A committed teacher, Nate has taught students from Columbia, Marshall, and Sedalia throughout college; his six current students will be featured in a studio recital in May 2023. Nate plans on pursuing a master of music in cello performance.

Born in Canada in 2006, Benjamin Smith grew up in Omaha, Nebraska and began studying cello at age 5 with Tim Strang at the Omaha Conservatory of Music. In 2018 he moved to Columbia, Missouri, where he now studies with Maestro Kirk Trevor and Dr. Henry Myers. He has played with the Missouri Symphony Conservatory orchestras and chamber programs, as well as with the newly formed Missouri Academy of Music. He regularly performs in both regular concerts and outreach performances throughout the community. He has performed in master classes with Jun Seo, David Kim, Alan Richardson, Jennifer Culp, and Paul Katz. Benjamin is now a junior at Rock Bridge High School and is a member of the school's chamber orchestra. He won 2nd place in the Missouri MTNA junior and senior strings competitions, won the 2021 Odyssey Concerto competition, and was a member of the 2023 Missouri All-State Orchestra. Benjamin is an active member of the Reseda Quartet.

Based in Houston, Texas, Trio Menil is a versatile ensemble at home in both the concert hall and classroom. Consisting of Rice University's Shepherd School of Music students, the trio has worked with James Dunham, Paul Kantor, Jon Kimura Parker, Virginia Weckstrom, and Kathleen Winkler.

Trio Menil is part of DACAMERA's Young Artist Program, where they present concerts in collaboration with art exhibitions, and teach music-integrative workshops in Houston public and private schools.

The trio is named after the Menil Collection, a museum and neighborhood of art in the heart of Houston, and shares the

same mission to attract, educate, and inspire diverse audiences through art.

South Korean violinist Jeongwon An is a versatile musician who has performed at international festivals including Mozarteum Sommerakademie, IMS Prussia Cove, and Aspen Music Festival, and in concert venues like the Kennedy Center, Walt Disney Concert Hall, and various halls in Asia. She performed the U.S. premiere of Yevhen Stankovych's "Almost Serenade" for Two Violins in recital with Oleh Krysa, and performed chamber music with James Dunham, Norman Fischer, and Jon Kimura Parker. She is completing her master's degree at the Shepherd School of Music with Paul Kantor, and graduated from the Eastman School of Music under Oleh Krysa, where she received the Peter Salaff Prize in Chamber Music. Jeongwon is currently playing on a 1703 G.B. Rogeri violin, generously on loan from the Maestro Foundation.

Cellist David Dietz has performed across the US and Europe and is experienced in a variety of settings as both a performer and a teacher. He currently resides in Houston, Texas. David received his Bachelor's Degree and Performer Diploma at Indiana University and recently completed his master's degree at Rice University in 2022. This past summer he was a teaching fellow at the Encore Chamber Music Festival in Cleveland, Ohio where he performed chamber music alongside the Verona Quartet and Sibbi Bernhardsson. In the 2022-2023 season, David will make appearances with Trio Menil, MUSIQA Houston, Aperio Ensemble, Classical C.A.R.M.A., DACAMERA Young Artists, Monarch Chamber Players, Ars Lyrica Houston, the Houston Grand Opera Orchestra, the Houston Cello Quartet and the Klangspuren Festival in Innsbruck, Austria.

Jonathan Mak is from Toronto, Canada, and began studying piano at the age of three. A year later, he made his orchestra debut with the Canadian Sinfonietta. He is currently pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts at Rice University with Jon Kimura Parker. He recently completed his master's degree at the Yale School of Music and bachelor's degree at the Cleveland Institute of Music, minoring in viola and German. Jonathan's accomplishments include the Canada Council for the Arts-Michael Measures award and the 2021 Sylva Gelber Music Foundation Award. He recently received the 3rd prize in the OSM competition, performing with the Orchestre symphonique de Montréal. An active chamber musician, he has been invited to perform at festivals including the Festival of the Sound, Ottawa Chamberfest, Edinburgh International Festival, and is a member of DACAMERA's Young Artist Program based in Houston, TX.

Alice K. Dade enjoys a career of great variety including concerto and chamber music appearances, recording projects, television appearances, and guest principal flute of orchestras. As a soloist, Ms. Dade is an award winner of the Olga Koussevitsky Wind Competition of the Musicians Club of New York and The New York Flute Club Competition. She has performed with the Guanajuato Symphony Orchestra (Mexico), Orquesta Sinfónica

Juvenil Red de Escuelas de Música de Medellín (Colombia), PRIZM Festival Orchestra, and the Festival Mozaic Orchestra. Ms. Dade has performed chamber music as part of the Busan One Asia Festival, Chestnut Hill Chamber Series, Concordia Chamber Players at The Princeton Festival, Summerfest of Kansas City, and National Flute Association Conventions. Ms. Dade's first solo album, Living Music, was released on Naxos in 2018. She can also be heard in chamber music recordings on Evidence Classics performing Michael Fine's Quintet for flute and string quartet and Arte Verum with soprano, Barbara Hendricks. Ms. Dade is a recurring guest star of a new PBS series called Now Hear This. Scott Yoo, Ms. Dade's husband and host of the show, travels the world chasing the secret histories of our greatest musical works and their composers while discovering connections to today's music, art, and culture. Ms. Dade attended The Juilliard School is a Powell Artist. She plays a handmade 14K Powell Flute with a platinum headjoint.



D. Lydia Redding was a violinist of the former Colorado String Quartet. The quartet was recognized on four continents as one of the finest string quartets on the international scene. Winners of both the Banff International String Quartet Competition and the Naumburg Chamber Music Award, their performances were noted for their musical integrity, impassioned playing and lyrical

finesse. Highlights of past years include tours of more than twenty countries and performances in major cities across the globe. New York appearances include the Mostly Mozart Festival, where they performed twenty Haydn Quartets over a two-year period, and concerts in Carnegie Hall and at Lincoln Center. The Colorado Quartet is Quartet-in-Residence at Bard College in New York State, where Quartet members taught private lessons, coach chamber ensembles and present courses on the Literature of the String Quartet. The ensemble was Quartet-in-Residence for 1998-99 at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, and has also held artist residencies at The New School in Philadelphia, Swarthmore and Skidmore

Colleges and Amherst College. They gave master classes across the continent, including at The Eastman School of Music, Northwestern University, The Banff Centre, Indiana University, University of Michigan at Ann Arbor and the University of Toronto, and are Artistic Directors of the Soundfest Chamber Music Festival and Quartet in Falmouth, Massachusetts. The Colorado Quartet's inspiring style combines a deep scholarly knowledge of the quartet literature with energy, passion, and a focus on fine details. Members of the Colorado Quartet served on the juries for several international competitions, including the Coleman Chamber Music Competition, Banff Quartet Competition and Concert Artists Guild Competition. Their critically acclaimed recordings of Beethoven, Schubert, Mendelssohn, Brahms and contemporary composers can be found on Parnassus, Mode and Albany Records. The Colorado Quartet commemorated its 20th anniversary in 2003 with a release of the first in a complete set of Beethoven Quartet recordings

Born in Montréal, Canadian pianist Lucille Chung has been acclaimed for her "stylish and refined" performances by Gramophone. She is the First Prize winner of the Stravinsky International Piano Competition and made her debut at the age of 10 with the Montreal Symphony Orchestra. Charles Dutoit subsequently invited her as soloist on the orchestra's tour to Asia.

She has since performed with over 70 leading orchestras around the world including the Philadelphia Orchestra, Moscow Virtuosi, BBC National Orchestra of Wales, KBS Orchestra, Israel Chamber Orchestra, Seoul Philharmonic, Orquesta Sinfónica de Tenerífe, Staatskapelle Weimar, UNAM Philharmonic (Mexico), Flemish Radio

Orchestra, Belgrade Philharmonic, Dallas Symphony, St. Louis Symphony, as well as all the major Canadian orchestras, including Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver among others. She has appeared with conductors such as Penderecki, Spivakov, Nézet-Séguin, Denève, Oundjian, Petrenko and Dutoit.

Lucille has given solo recitals on the finest concert halls in over 35 countries including New York's Carnegie Hall and Lincoln Center, Washington's Kennedy Center and Phillips Collection, the Myra Hess Series in Chicago, the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam, the Wigmore Hall in London, and Madrid's Auditorio Nacional. Festival appearances include the Verbier Festival, Incontri in Terra di Siena, Felicja Blumental Festival in Israel, International Keyboard Institute and Festival in NYC, MDR Festival in Dresden, Bard Festival in NY, Music@Menlo and the Santander International Festival, where she premiered the 6 Piano Etudes by I.D. Martínez.

Lucille graduated from both the Curtis Institute and the Juilliard School before she turned 20. She then furthered her studies in Europe with Maria Curcio-Diamand, Arthur Schnabel's

protégée, at the "Mozarteum" in Salzburg, Hochschule für Musik "Franz Liszt" Weimar and Accademia Pianistica in Imola, Italy, where she worked with the late Lazar Berman. She also worked with Joaquín Achúcarro at SMU where she was the Johnson-Prothro an Artist-in-Residence from 2015-2019. She is the recipient of the prestigious Virginia Parker Prize by the Canada Council of the Arts and the Honors Diploma from the Accademia Chigiana in Siena, Italy.

Lucille has been receiving excellent reviews worldwide for her discs of the complete works of Ligeti as well as Scriabin piano works on the Dynamic label, garnering the maximum 5 Stars from the BBC Music Magazine and Fono Forum in Germany, as well as R10 from Répertoire Classica in France. Her diverse discography also includes "Saint-Saëns Piano Transcriptions", "Mozart & Me", Mendelssohn Piano Concertos, and for Signum Records, Poulenc Piano Works, Liszt Piano Works, and a four-hand recital which includes Stravinsky's Pétrouchka with pianist Alessio Bax.

Lucille is fluent in French, English, Korean, Italian, German and Russian. She and her husband, pianist Alessio Bax make their home in New York City with their daughter, Mila, and are artistic co-directors of the Joaquín Achúcarro Foundation.



Praised by The Strad magazine and The New York Times, internationally renowned cellist Amit Peled is acclaimed as one of the most exciting and virtuosic instrumentalists on the concert stage today. Having performed in many of the world's most prestigious venues, including Carnegie Hall and Alice Tully Hall at the Lincoln Center in New York, the John F. The Cercis String Quartet is a group of friends committed to fostering human connection through a shared passion for music. Violinists Sun Huh & Nathaniel Shapiro, violist Christopher Alley and cellist Kevin Flynn are alumni of the Indiana University Bloomington Jacobs School of Music. Since 2021, the quartet has been critically well-received throughout the Midwest and Ohio River valley for their engaging and dynamic performances.

Highlights of the 2022–23 season include a residency with the International Chamber Orchestra of Puerto Rico including a recital and masterclasses, as well as outreach events for children across the island of Puerto Rico. Their Fall 2022 tour included recitals in Vincennes, IN, and Grand Valley State University, MI, culminating in a featured performance in the Absolute Music Chamber Series in Lansing, MI, broadcast live on WKAR. Plaza Winds is the Graduate Fellowship Woodwind Quintet at the University of Missouri in Kansas City (UMKC), and it is one of the Conservatory's premier performing ensembles. Competition for these fellowships is extremely strong, and the program, founded in 1993, attracts top graduate students from throughout the United States and abroad.

The quintet won the 2015 St. Louis Artist Presentation Society Competition and were National Finalists in the 2014-15 MTNA (Music Teachers National Association) Chamber Music Competition. Recently, the ensemble received second place at the 2020 Coltman Chamber Music Competition in Austin, Texas. In its current form, the group includes members from all over the country, including Texas, Wyoming, Tennessee, Minnesota, and New York. Members are all graduate

students whose previous schooling includes studies at top conservatories and universities such as the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, the Lynn Conservatory, Penn State University, and West Texas A&M University.

With repertoire ranging from the classics of the woodwind quintet canon to some of the newest works for this combination of instruments, the group maintains an active presence both on and off campus, reflecting the UMKC Conservatory's commitment to community engagement. Activities in recent years include recitals on campus, world premieres by emerging composers, a presentation at the College Music Society Regional Conference, concerts at local museums, a performance for ArtsKC, performances at UMKC's annual Kansas City Conducting Symposiums and Midwest Honor Band Festivals, and virtual appearances for the Friends of Chamber Music series. The group has played at Ronald McDonald House for families with critically ill children, brought music to nursing homes and retirement communities, given children's concerts at daycare centers, and contributed their artistry to services and other activities at local houses of worship. Members of the quintet also play important roles in the UMKC Conservatory's large ensembles.

In addition to their intensive work with coach Celeste Johnson-Frehner, they have performed in chamber music master classes for the Berlin Philharmonic Wind Quintet, Imani Winds, Borealis Wind Quintet, Gewandhaus Wind Quintet (Leipzig), PRISM Quartet, Eighth Blackbird, Kansas City Symphony Music Director Michael Stern, and the United States Army Field Band Woodwind Quintet.


